Celebrate Jesus!

Easter in Kenya is celebrated quite differently than it is here in the United States. Here people spend a lot of time and money to dress up in the nicest clothes they can afford before they attend church on Easter morning, sing a few songs, and then go out to lunch with the family.

In Kenya, churches designate a cave in the countryside, or perhaps a church, as the “tomb.” Early on Easter morning, worshipers wake up, throw on clothes and rush out, in an attempt to reach the destination first. Upon arrival, they peek inside and exclaim, “He’s not here!” As several gather, they sing praise songs and then run back to their homes, telling those they pass, “He’s not there! He’s not there!” Of course, others must see for themselves, so they continue to the tomb, only to find their predecessor correct. They exclaim, “Truly, he’s not here!” They dance and sing praise songs before rushing home, telling those who arise later the news. All finally gather for the morning service and greet each other with the joyous news they have seen for themselves: “Christ has truly risen!”

What difference might it make in our city if each Christian celebrated this Easter more like the Christians in Kenya? This Easter try greeting everyone with:

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Who Will Take The Son?

A wealthy man and his son loved to collect rare works of art. They had everything in their collection, from Picasso to Raphael. They would often sit together and admire the works of art.

When the Vietnam conflict broke out, the son went to war. He was very courageous and died in battle while rescuing another soldier. The father was notified and grieved deeply for his only son.

About a month later, just before Christmas, there was a knock at the door. A young man stood at the door with a large package in his hands.

He said, "Sir, you don't know me, but I'm the soldier for whom your son gave his life. He saved many lives that day. He was carrying me to safety when a bullet struck him in the heart and he died instantly. He often talked about you, and your love for art." The young man held out this package. "I know this isn't much. I'm not really a great artist, but I think your son would have wanted you to have this."

The father opened the package. It was a portrait of his son, painted by the young man. He stared in awe at the way the soldier had captured the personality of his son in the painting. The father was so drawn to the eyes that his own eyes welled up with tears. He thanked the young man and offered to pay him for the picture. "Oh, no sir, I could never repay what your son did for me. It's a gift."

The father hung the portrait over his mantle. Every time

visitors came to his home he took them to see the portrait of his son before he showed them any of the other great works he had collected.

The man died a few months later. There was to be a great auction of his paintings. Many influential people gathered, excited over seeing the great paintings and having an opportunity to purchase one for their collection.

On the platform sat the painting of the son. The auctioneer pounded his gavel. "We will start the bidding with this picture of the son. Who will bid for this picture?"

There was silence.

Then a voice in the back of the room shouted, "We want to see the famous paintings. Skip this one."



But the auctioneer persisted. "Will somebody bid for this painting? Who will start the bidding? \$100, \$200?"

Another voice angrily said, "We didn't come to see this painting. We came to see the Van Goghs and the Rembrandts. Get on with the real bids!"

But still the auctioneer continued. "The son! The son! Who will take the son?"

Finally, a voice came from the very back of the room. It was the

longtime gardener of the man and his son. "I'll give \$10 for the painting." Being a poor man, it was all he could afford.

"We have \$10, who will bid \$20?"

"Give it to him for \$10. Let's see the masters."

"\$10 is the bid, won't someone bid \$20?"

The crowd was becoming angry. They didn't want the picture of the son.

They wanted the more worthy investments for their collections.

The auctioneer pounded the gavel. "Going once, twice, SOLD for \$10!"

A man sitting on the second row shouted, "Now let's get on with the collection!"

The auctioneer laid down his gavel. "I'm sorry, the auction is over."

"What about the paintings?"

"I am sorry. When I was called to conduct this auction, I was told of a secret stipulation in the will. I was not allowed to reveal that stipulation until this time. Only the painting of the son would be auctioned. Whoever bought that painting would inherit the entire estate, including the paintings. The man who took the son gets everything!"

God gave his son to die for us 2,000 years ago. Much like the auctioneer, his message today is: "The Son, the Son, who will take the Son?" You see, whoever takes the Son gets everything.

The Essential 100

If you read the first 10 essential passages during the month of February, you met the author of the book as he described the excellent world he created. Then he told about creating man as his highest creation by giving him not only a mind, will and emotions (soul) and a physical body like the animals but also a spiritual body like the angels and thus man is three in one like God is three in one.


Then we read that Satan (a fallen angel) declared war on man by tempting him to disobey God like he, himself and a third of the angels had done. When man fell for Satan's tempting lies, he effectively worshiped Satan rather than God so he immediately died spiritually and eventually would die physically. But God showed his love by providing the skins of animals to cover man's nakedness and he promised to send one who would crush Satan and restore man to the perfect relationship he had before the disobedience.

God showed his love again 1,656 years later when he sent a flood to wipe out all the creatures that walked on or flew about the ground except for Noah, his family, and representatives of all the animals. After the flood, God promised Noah that he would never again wipe out all living creatures with a flood.

Then we read how God

dispersed men and confused their language at the Tower of Babel to keep them from a great disobedience. God later called Abram to leave that land where the tower was built and go to a land that he would give him.

When Abram reached that land, God promised his heirs would be great in number and that they would inherit the land. God changed Abram's name to Abraham and promised he would father a son even though he was over 90 years old. When Abraham was 100 years old, Isaac was born as the son of promise. But when he was a teenager, God commanded Abraham to offer Isaac as a



burnt offering on the mountaintop where eventually God's temple would be built.

Isaac had two sons, Jacob and Esau, who competed for their father's blessing and inheritance. Jacob bought the inheritance for a meal of beans, deceived Isaac to receive the blessing and then fled to live with relatives. While there, he worked for seven years to be married to one girl but was deceived by the father into marrying her sister. So he worked for another seven years

so he could marry the first girl as well. After Jacob had eleven sons, he decided to return to the land promised to Abraham. On his way he met and was reconciled with his brother, Esau, so that they would not be at war with one another.


Paint Some Stones!




There are signs along the road to point us on our way. If you saw the signs below, would you know what they mean?

Ten years into their service, Keith was discouraged by IMB organizational changes that seemed to question the sustainability of their ministry.

But during a return stateside and discussions with some Women's Missionary Union ladies who had raised him in the faith and prayed for him on the field, his attitude changed. Through their sustaining prayers, he and his family returned to Macao to be part of God-orchestrated partnerships in medical evangelism and church planting.

Dr. Morgan asks prayer for wisdom as the clinic transitions to national management and for opportunities to reproduce Hope Clinic's ministries in new locations.


